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Dear Friends

***When eight days had passed, the time came to circumcise the child; and they called him Jesus, the name the angel had given even before conception. When the time came for him to be purified according to the law of Moses, they brought him to Jerusalem to present him to the Lord (as it is written in the law of the Lord), 'Every firstborn male shall be designated as holy to the Lord'. They offered a sacrifice as prescribed in the law of the Lord, 'a pair of turtle doves or two young pigeons.' When they had done everything the law of the Lord required, they returned to their hometown of Nazareth in Galilee. The child grew in strength and wisdom, and God's favour rested on him. [Luke 2:21-24, 39-40]***

“And it’s from the old I travel to the new” – so runs the popular hymn of Sydney Carter – and those words perfectly capture a truth at the heart of the gospel, that in Christ we see a new beginning. Yet, read the account of the presentation of Jesus at the temple and you would think that nothing was going to change at all. Jesus was brought according to the law of Moses, presented at the temple as it was written in the law of the Lord, and a sacrifice offered as prescribed in the law of the Lord. It was only when they had done everything the law required that Mary and Joseph felt able to return home.

Do not be fooled though, for once Jesus began his ministry it became clear that he brought a decisive break with the old. “You have heard it said”, he told the crowd, concerning various points of the law, “but I say to you,” after which he would set out a new and revolutionary interpretation of established wisdom. This was a break with the past, a parting of the ways between old and new, but it was not a complete parting, for he was also able to say, “Do not think I have come to abolish the law or the prophets; I have come not to abolish but to fulfil.” From the old has come something new.

By the time you read this you may either be preparing to come to the “Get to know you” weekend on the 28/29 January, have just been to it or worrying about what it all means for Warwick Road United Reformed Church. I hope that you can come to the Sunday worship the following week on the 5 February when we shall have a Church Meeting following the service to talk through where we feel we are being called as a Church, what our concerns are and whether we feel ready to take the next step, travelling from old to new.

Remember that if we turn from the birth of Jesus, to his death 33 years later, he was presented to God in Jerusalem once again, only this time there were to be no sacrifices offered on his behalf, he **was** the sacrifice! Here, supremely, is the Christ who brings new life out of old, transforming what **has** been into what **shall** be. He continues to do the same in our lives today, taking what we are and reshaping our lives day by day, into a new creation.

## LENT COURSE - Starting 1 March

### - *The Return of the Prodigal Son*

The Return of the Prodigal Son Lent Course is based on the book of the same name, written after Henri Nouwen was deeply affected by Rembrandt's painting, 'The Return of the Prodigal Son'. That painting led Nouwen on a deep spiritual journey which significantly impacted his life, and the Lent Course hopes to reflect on the meaning of the parable for our own lives.

Divided into five sessions, we are taken on a journey through the younger son receiving his inheritance and leaving home, the heartache of being away from home, the sombre return, the unexpected open arms of his father, and the encounter with the older son's anger and jealousy. Each facet of the story becomes a personal meditation which engages us in our own relationship with God and others.

If we have experienced resentment, envy, loneliness, rejection, or anger, we will find ourselves in this story and will respond to the possibilities of reconciliation, affirmation, compassion, and homecoming.

**The course will be held each week from 1 March at 2 pm and 7.30 pm at Wyken URC led by different Coventry URC Ministers with the final session on Thursday 29 March.**

## Clare's Recipe of the Month

### **SULTANA SCONES**

*1lb SR Flour*

*3oz Margarine*

*Pinch Baking Powder*

*2 Eggs (whisked)*

*Sprinkle of Sultanas*

1. Rub the margarine into the flour so it resembles breadcrumbs.
2. Add baking powder, sugar and sultanas.
3. Add the whisked eggs and mix to make a dough.
4. Roll out dough to about 1" thickness and cut out.
5. Cook on Gas mark 6/180°C for approx 15-20 mins.

**Commitment for Life** As well as providing funds for chosen projects, Commitment for Life supports organisations such as the Jubilee Debt Campaign and the World Development Campaign. The following release from C for L provides food for thought.

UK money will be used for a 'climate loan' to Jamaica, increasing its already heavy debt burden, following a decision by the World Bank. Campaigners have condemned the loan, which will drive the Caribbean nation deeper into poverty. Jamaica's foreign debt stands at \$2,500 per person, and the country spends \$1.2 billion a year on debt repayments. The government's foreign-owed debts are 55% of national income, making its debt burden one of the heaviest in the world.

The \$10 million loan agreed is intended to help Jamaica adapt to the effects of climate change. But campaigners say countries like the UK should give climate change funds as grants rather than loans. Jubilee debt spokesman Tim Jones says "Debt has devastated lives across the world bringing economic collapse and diverting money from essential services." The Jamaican government already spends \$450 per person annually on debt repayments, more than on education and healthcare combined. The World Bank and UK government should be cancelling Jamaica's debt, not adding to it.

World Development Movement campaigner Murray Worthy says "the UK and other rich industrialised countries bear the responsibility for causing climate change, both historically and currently. We owe it to countries like Jamaica to help them adapt to the ravages of climate change - in fact we owe them money rather than the other way round."

## GEORGE HERBERT

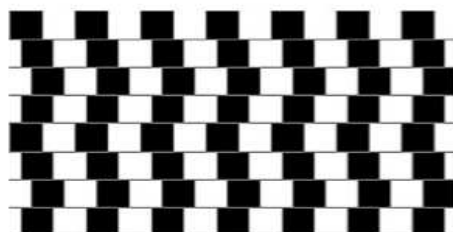
Born the seventh of 10 children in 1593, George Herbert grew up to be well known as a scholar and became a Member of Parliament. In 1630 he became a parish priest and spent the rest of his life in a small Wiltshire village. He preached, wrote poetry, helped rebuild the church and cared deeply for his parishioners who called him the 'Holy Mr. Herbert'.

He died aged 40 of tuberculosis, and perhaps we would never have heard of him were it not for his poems. He hid patterns and puns in his poems: in one called 'Easter Wings' the printed words look like the wings of birds soaring into the sky. A number of his poems became hymns, such as 'King of Glory, King of Peace', 'Let All the World in Every Corner Sing' and 'Teach me, my God and King'.



There is a window honouring George Herbert in Westminster Abbey, but he lives on in the words of hymns that are still sung today.
